The paper will investigate the close relationship between geographical knowledge and imperial politics in the Ottoman Empire during the long eighteenth century. In doing so, it aims to challenge the traditional understanding that portrays the early modern Ottoman Empire as the *dark age* of Muslim scientific inquiry. Drawing on the works of intellectuals such as authors and translators Katip Çelebi and Ebu Bekir ibn Behram el-Dimashki, the paper will argue that Ottoman ruling elites and geographers did indeed participate in intellectual discussions, transnational networks and political developments of the eighteenth century. In their works, these geographers offered an organized and explicit definition of the science of geography for their readers and emphasized the usefulness of geographical knowledge in resolving political and military conflicts. In both regards they were influential on ruling elites during the 17th and 18th centuries, a period typically regarded as the beginning of Ottoman decline.
